

Love & Marriage

In some ways it is sharing these painful moments, choosing to talk to your husband or wife about things, no matter how bad, that bind a couple together.

But even more so in marriage, it is knowing that even in those times when you think that you can’t bear to spend another moment in your wife’s presence because you need your own space, or you fear that this time things have gone too far and your husband can’t possibly want to be with you any more, on one special day you both chose to stand up in front of family, friends and God to commit yourselves legally to each other for life through those good and bad times. There is a real comfort and security in knowing your partner feels the same way about you and has chosen to love you, warts and all, forever and stay with you always. It is this security in love which helps make the fragrant times even sweeter.

Love is a wonderful thing, and wedding days are joyous occasions; but committed marriages are really worth celebrating. To do just that, we at St Vigor’s are holding a Celebration of Marriage Service on Valentine’s Day this year, which falls on a Sunday, at 3 pm at St Vigor’s Church.
